Dear Friends,

Last month I celebrated my 60<sup>th</sup> birthday. It was a lovely small little party with some of my closest friends. After enjoying some good food we took turns playing our favorite songs. Not a big surprise in that most of my friends are musicians and we all love to play! Two of my friends are professionals in the “hospitality” business and they helped with the cooking and the decorating and setting up. With fun in mind and good taste they added those decorative touches that change a house from a comfortable hominess into a place with the spirit of celebration! So it was on the next day, with everyone gone, a table full of party food leftovers, I was sitting on the couch savoring the events of the previous day. At one point my eyes stopped on one of the balloons that was still floating around the room carried on the breeze of people walking by or doors being opened and shut. My first reaction was “what a silly, useless thing!” But then, with time to let my mind wander, I began to wonder. This balloon, a meaningless thing, or is it? Certainly compared to all of the profound and important things in life this balloon was completely insignificant. But this simple little piece of rubber with some air in it, was one of the little touches that transformed our house into the party atmosphere which everyone had so enjoyed the day before. And

here it was, still lingering. Still gently bouncing along the floor reminding me of the good spirit we all shared in and that I was, here on the day after, still enjoying. And then it occurred to me, that this little balloon as a “thing” might be completely transitory and inconsequential but the effect it had on the spirits of the people who had gathered to celebrate the day was not!

It occurred to me, that this balloon was something very similar to music. Music, when it is played live, is something completely transitory and in some ways insubstantial. It happens, and then just as quickly as it starts, it is over and gone. In spite of the amazingly wonderful technology that allows us to record music, much of, if not most of, the best music that occurs simply vanishes into the ether of time, never to be heard again. And yet the momentary experience of hearing music can have profound and long lasting consequences.

This month we will be studying the parables of Jesus in our Sunday School classes and worship services. Much of what Jesus speaks to is the importance of our actions in the world. It seems to me that most of the things we do are small, insignificant, transitory, and in the larger scheme of things, seemingly unimportant. But balloons, and music, say exactly the opposite. They say that the little things we do, even though they may not seem to be important, even though they may not seem to last, even

though they may not seem significant actually do have a profound and lasting effect on the spirits of those we share them with. Even when we might feel silly about something, just remember the balloon! What could be sillier? And yet those silly little things have a tremendous power to transform the feeling of a room and the spirits of the people who gather there. And even when we might feel like our actions will have no lasting effect, remember the experience of hearing live music. It is gone forever as soon as it stops, and yet it too can have a profound affect on the atmosphere, and even the thoughts and feelings of the people who are hearing it. The good works, the kind and encouraging words, the helpful gestures that we do in the course of a day may seem inconsequential, they may seem to evaporate into the ether of time so quickly, and they may seem insignificant in the large scale of world events. But in the realm of the spirit, the “kingdom of God” as Jesus would call it, those little acts of kindness are like stars in the heavens. They may be tiny, but they are beautiful nonetheless. And when they are added together with all of the other tiny little acts of kindness and good-will that people do, they fill the heavens with a beauty that is not only magnificent, but useful in the patterns they create. Someone is just as likely to stay on or even find the right path as a result of a simple act of kindness as a sailor finds his way by looking at the stars.

It is not our place to judge even our own actions. It is just ours to do good any where and every where we can. For in the end, the value of our actions is measured by our intention and the effect they have on the well-being of spirit. Even if they seem to fail or be useless in the material world even the smallest of gestures do not go unnoticed or unappreciated by God. Please remember this the next time you see a balloon, or hear someone singing a song, or have an opportunity to offer a helping hand or a kind word, or see some small way to make this world a better place.

## East of Eden



Wondering what to do with your stash of old batteries or the cans of unneeded paint taking up space in your garage? Resist the temptation to toss them in the trash. The reason: they (and everything on the list below) contain toxic chemicals capable of contaminating the environment if not disposed of properly.

Unlike items that are picked up at the curb, you'll have to make a special effort to unload these ones responsibly. But, with a little advance planning and some good info, you'll see that it's really quite simple to dispose of these seemingly mysterious items. Here's how:

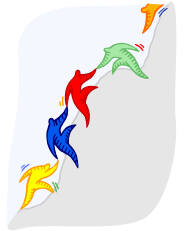
- **Batteries.** Recycling rechargeable batteries is fairly easy. Home Depot, Staples, Radio Shack, Best Buy, and other retailers take them back free of charge. There are fewer options for single-use batteries, but look for bins at your local Whole Foods Market, Ikea, or library. Otherwise, your best bet is the local household hazardous waste drop-off site.
- **CFLs.** These energy-efficient bulbs are becoming easier to get rid of. Just drop old bulbs off at any Home Depot or Ikea for free recycling. Or ask about CFL recycling at your local Ace Hardware or home improvement store.
- **Electronics.** Every retailer that takes back rechargeable batteries also accepts mobile phones, as do most wireless providers. For computers, cameras, televisions, and others it's worthwhile to do a little homework because some stores charge fees depending on item and brand. Check out Best Buy, Staples, and Office Depot to see what's the best fit. Some places, like Radio Shack, have trade-in programs where you can receive store credit for your old gadgets.
- **Motor Oil.** In case you need some motivation, consider this factoid from Earth911: Every gallon of used motor oil that's improperly disposed of can contaminate one million gallons of drinking water. Bring it to Wal-Mart, Autozone, Jiffy Lube, or search online for more convenient choices.
- **Paint.** It's among the harder items in this group to dispose of, but it's worth it and totally

doable. If the paint is still in good shape, consider donating it. As of now, there aren't any retailers that accept used paint so you'll need to make a special trip. Search Earth911 for a comprehensive list of options.

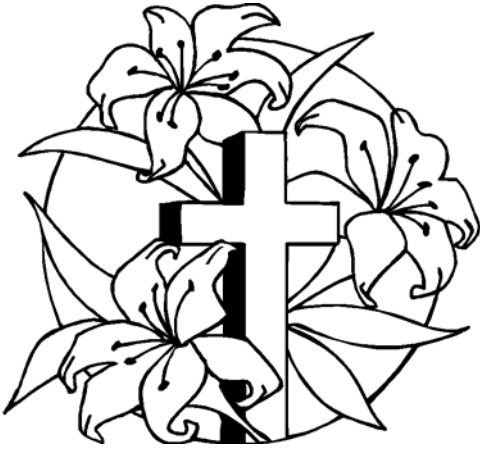
